Likewise, in the case of Nicaragua, the country's own conditions have not allowed it. In Costa Rica, there is a certified base of about 900 producers, most of them with less than 50 hectares, which has been very costly to maintain and strengthen, and there are other small producers who are not interested in certification or who do not yet meet all the requirements of the certification standards.
