At the moment, the process has begun with the Mexican and Nicaraguan mills. These countries have their own circumstances that have not made it possible to achieve certification in 2022; therefore, a more realistic goal was proposed, to certify the directly managed in 2026 and the producers in 2030.

When there is a changing supply base, as in Mexico, it is very difficult to certify independent producers because they are free to sell their fresh fruit bunches to different mills. Likewise, in the case of Nicaragua, the country's own conditions have not allowed it. In Costa Rica, there is a certified base of about 832 producers, most of them with less than 50 hectares, which has been very costly to maintain and strengthen and there are other small producers who are not interested in certification or who do not yet meet all the requirements of the certification standards.
