The delivered activities include: the development of equitable and sustainable spatial planning, strengthening villages/community groups in the management of natural resources through capacity building, the development of (alternative/existing) sustainable livelihoods which support forest conservation, strengthening Independent Smallholders of Oil Palm (ISPs) through capacity improvement on Good Agricultural Practices (GAP), promoting High Conservation Areas (HCV) in productive landscapes through facilitation at district, province, and national levels, and strengthening indigenous people and local community in protecting that traditional/customary areas.

Support oil palm companies to conduct FFS in the surrounding villages of their plantation.

Facilitate groups of smallholder oil palm farmers/ISPs to apply for STDB by collecting data, mapping, etc. for applying STDB (Cultivation Registration Certificate) submitted to the Distanakbun of Ketapang District as one of the procedures to get the ISPO and RSPO certification based on Presidential Regulation No.44/2020 concerning the Indonesian sustainable oil palm plantation certification system and Minister of Agriculture Regulation No.38/2020 concerning the implementation of Indonesian oil palm plantation certification.

Public - Private Partnership to protect HCVA

The Ketapang High Conservation Value Area (HCVA) aims to function as a wildlife corridor especially for orangutan (Pongo pygmaeus wurmbii) to cross between Sungai Putri peatland production forest (with 900 - 1,250 orangutan) in Southern Ketapang to Gunung Tarak Protection Forest in Eastern Ketapang and Gunung Palung National Park in Northern Ketapang, which is known as the highest orangutan population in West Kalimantan Province with 2,500 orangutans (Wich et. al., 2008). One of the key aspects to conserve this HCVA is by providing sustainable deforestation free livelihoods for village communities living around the HCVA.

The development of public-private partnership between Ketapang District Government, private companies and NGOs will pave the way to sustainable HCVA protection through community business inclusion.

HCVA Data Inventory for West Kalimantan

A circular letter issued by West Kalimantan Plantation and Livestock Agency (Distanakbun) requests oil palm companies to submit data on their HCV areas (HCVA). The letter was sent to 363 companies in West Kalimantan Province. It is part of the implementation of the West Kalimantan Provincial regulation No.6/2018 about sustainable land-based business management which dictates forestry, plantation, mining, and agriculture land-based businesses to allocate at least 7% of their concession permit areas as HCVA. The data will also become data inventory of conservation areas in palm oil management units in West Kalimantan.

HCVA Identification and Monitoring Training

Tropenbos Indonesia worked together with GIZ SASCI+ to facilitate the West Kalimantan Plantation Agency in organizing an HCVA Identification and monitoring training in Pontianak on 8 and 9 November 2022. The training was attended by 33 Agricultural and Plantation Agency representatives of most districts in West Kalimantan Province. It aims to support the mainstreaming of HCVA identification, monitoring and evaluation done through the capacity building and strengthened roles of Plantation Agencies at district level. This training aims to synchronize between Plantation Agencies with the already assigned of Environment and Forestry Agencies (DLHK). This can also strengthen the implementation of West Kalimantan Province Regulation No. 6/2018 on Sustainable Land-based Business Management, in which each land-based business permit should at least allocate 7% of their permit as conservation areas or HCVA.
