#### 1.1 What are the main activities of your organisation?

Tropenbos Indonesia focuses its commitment to natural resource issues by taking into account cross-scale relationships either administratively, at the national, provincial and district levels, or at grass root and landscape levels. Among the activities in current landscape in Ketapang-Kayong Utara District, West Kalimantan, include:  $\hat{O}CB$  Peatland degradation control: development of freshwater fish and fruit cultivation as an alternative and combination of sustainable livelihoods in peatlands (Pematang Gadung Landscape).  $\hat{O}CB$  Introduction of alternative livelihoods: empowering women and youth groups in mushroom cultivation, nursery of forest plants, mineral water business, development of various product made from local raw materials (pineapple, mushroom, honey) (Pematang Gadung and Gunung Palung Landscapes).  $\hat{O}CB$  Strengthening Independent Palm Oil Smallholders: strengthening capacity and institution, Good Agricultural Practices/GAP, and facilitation for cultivation registration certificate (STDB) (Pematang Gadung Landscape).  $\hat{O}CB$  Initiation and facilitation of multi-stakeholder collaboration: management planning of orangutan corridors to become Essential Ecosystem Area through the Governor Regulation No.718/2018) (Sungai Putri-Gunung Palung Landscapes).  $\hat{O}CB$  Utilization of responsible environmental services: development of forest and waterfall ecotourism, mineral water, and non-wood craft products (Gunung Palung Landscape).  $\hat{O}CB$  Strengthening the capacity of village forest management forum and village forest institution: forest protection (peat swamp and mineral land), initiatives for national carbon funding schemes (National Determined Contribution (NDC) and sustainable trade schemes (Sustainable Commodity Conservation Mechanism / SCCM), forest resource-based business (Gunung Palung, Pematang Gadung and Simpang Dua Landscapes).  $\hat{O}CB$  Village participatory mapping: encouraging active participation of community in spatial planning and development planning based on Village Potential (Gu

1.2 What activities has your organisation undertaken to publicise programmes to support the RSPO, RSPO certification, the uptake of RSPO-certified sustainable palm oil and oil palm products, or to support good standing RSPO members during the reporting period?

Mainstreaming HCV approach as part of the requirements to comply with RSPO certification. The activities include: - Collaboration with oil palm companies in managing HCV areas and utilize the area also for the benefit of the community. For example, in 2019 Tropenbos Indonesia supporting the collaboration between PT KAL and the community ecotourism group of Laman Satong Village to utilize the HCV 657 of PT KAL as one of the ecotourism destinations developed by the community based ecotourism group. The collaboration is also supported by/under supervision of the Gunung Palung National Park. - As part of the formulation team appointed by the DG KSDAE - MoEF completing a draft of technical guideline on identification and management of HCV area at MU and Landscape/Jurisdiction Level. Waiting for the approval of the Minister to be issued. - Provided input and recommendation to HCVRN in the formulation of HCV Screening Guideline on HCV Landscape/Jurisdiction and provide technical support in testing the guideline in Kapuas Hulu District, West Kalimantan. https://hcvnetwork.org/new-guidance-for-using-the-hcv-approach-at-landscape-and-jurisdictional-scales/ - Provided input to IBCSD (Indonesian Business Council on Sustainable Development) on its guidance in mainstreaming the HCV approach for maintaining biodiversity in the mining sector and giving technical support in field testing of the guidance and in training for mining stakeholders in Sulawesi - Continue the Lobby and advocacy efforts at landscape up to province and national levels on the adoption of HCV Landscape approach and supporting the government on the implementation of KEE (Essential Ecosystem Area).
